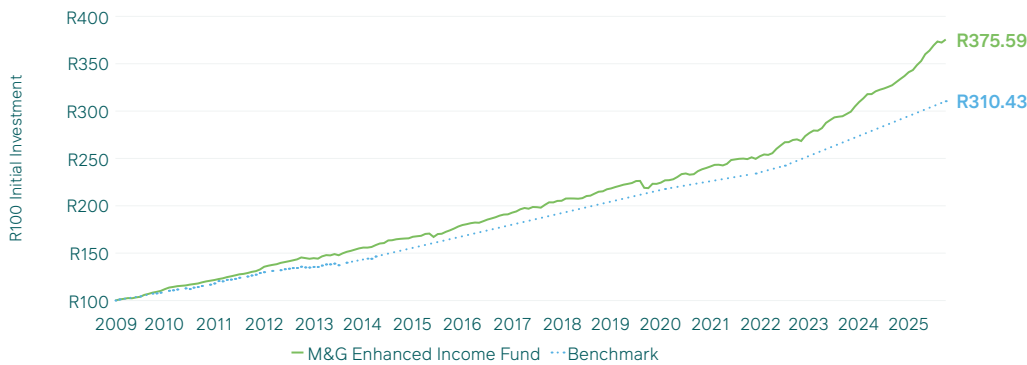

Fund objective

To maximise total returns in excess of the benchmark over a rolling 36-month period, while seeking to protect capital and reduce volatility through active asset management.

Investor profile

Those requiring an actively managed income solution that provides a high income return together with moderate capital growth. The recommended investment horizon is 1 to 3 years.

Investment mandate

The Fund invests in a diversified mix of local and foreign equity, bonds, listed property and cash. The Fund may also invest in derivatives and other collective investment schemes. Asset allocation is actively and tactically managed to achieve the Fund's objectives. The intended maximum limits are Equity 10%, Listed Property 25% and Foreign 45%. The Fund is managed to comply with regulations governing retirement fund investments (Regulation 28).

Fund commentary

The ceasefire deal struck between the instigators of the war in the Middle East (Israel and the USA) with Iran that occurred in April allowed risk assets to recover. Global markets have become immune to the vitriol emanating from the White House and the TACO (Trump Always Chickens Out) trade that originated in 2025 lives strong in 2026. The war has so far been very much an own goal for Trump in terms of fuelling the inflationary fire that has driven the cost-of-living crisis in the US since Covid and led to huge political ramifications. The cost-of-living crisis that got Trump re-elected in 2024 has only worsened in his second term and Republicans have almost resigned to the fact that they will be losing "Bigly" in the mid-term elections later this year. The cost of energy has obviously jumped in the wake of the war, but energy security has come to the fore too. While it was the US that started the war, they have energy security as a net energy exporter. It is the rest of the world that has far bigger problems with the fallout from the war. The clock is ticking in terms of stocks of key energy products as even with an end to the war, it is widely expected that it will take a lengthy period for energy to be free flowing again in global markets and therefore prices may not return to pre-war levels anytime soon.

South African bond yields rallied hard on the news of the Pakistani brokered ceasefire deal. In fact, the magnitude of the rally was multiples of that seen in many core fixed income markets. Volatility in SA government bonds has increased relative to several other markets. The price action has seen yields take the elevator down but the escalator up. Bond yields bottomed on Friday, 17 April following some favourable headlines which never materialised and then gradually increased into month-end.

While the MPC of the SARB adopted a dovish tone at the March MPC, members of the committee a few weeks later began sounding more hawkish in Washington at the IMF/World Bank meetings. The continuation of the war and the high price of oil and related products apparently led them to reconsider their approach and consider that action may be required sooner rather than later if they were to maintain confidence in their ability to keep inflation expectations close to their 3.0% inflation target. Market expectations for the repo rate have oscillated wildly since the start of the war and at end-April the market was looking for 100 basis points worth of interest rate hikes over the next year. This is a huge swing in terms of expectations as the market was looking for several interest rate cuts before the onset of the war.

Over the past 12 months the Fund delivered a total return of 13.6%, which compares favourably to both the benchmark (StEFl Composite) return of 7.2% and the ASISA category average gain of 10.8%. More importantly, over the past 3 years the Fund provided an annualised return of 11.6% which was comfortably ahead of the benchmark return of 8.0% and the peer average of 9.9%.

Glossary

| 12-month yield | A measure of the Fund's income distributions as a percentage of the Fund's net asset value (NAV). This is calculated by summing the income distributions over a rolling 12-month period, then dividing by the sum of the NAV at the end of the period and any capital gains distributed over the same period. |
| 1-year income return | The portion of the return of the Fund that is attributed to income generated over the last 12 months, assuming the investor reinvests all distributions and incurs no transaction fees or taxes. |
| Annualised performance | The average amount of money (total return) earned by an investment each year over a given time period. For periods longer than one year, total returns are expressed as compounded average returns on a yearly basis. |
| Cumulative performance graph | This illustrates how an initial investment of R100 or N\$100 (for example) placed into the Fund would change over time, taking ongoing fees into account, with all distributions reinvested. |
| Income distribution | The dividend income and/or interest income that is generated by the underlying Fund investments and that is periodically declared and distributed to investors in the Fund after all annual service fees. |
| Information ratio | Measures the Fund's active return (Fund return in excess of the benchmark) divided by the amount of risk that the manager takes relative to the benchmark. The higher the information ratio, the higher the active return of the Fund, given the amount of risk taken and the more consistent the manager. This is calculated over a 3-year period. |
| Intended maximum limits | This indicates the Fund's intended maximum exposure to an asset class. These limits may be reviewed subject to the Fund's Supplemental Deed and/or Regulation 28 for those Funds managed in accordance with Regulation 28 of the Pension Funds Act. |
| Maximum drawdown | The largest drop in the Fund's cumulative total return from peak to trough over any period. |
| Monthly volatility (annualised) | Also known as standard deviation. This measures the amount of variation or difference in the monthly returns on an investment. The larger the annualised monthly volatility, the more the monthly returns are likely to vary from the average monthly return (i.e. the more volatile the investment). |
| Percentage of positive rolling 12 months | The percentage of months, since inception, that the Fund has shown a positive return over a rolling 12-month period. |
| Regulation 28 | The South African retirement fund industry is governed by the Pension Funds Act, No 24 of 1956. Regulation 28 of the Pension Funds Act prescribes the maximum limits in asset classes that an approved retirement fund may invest in. |
| Sharpe ratio | The Sharpe ratio is used to measure how well the return of an asset compensates the investor for the risk taken. The higher the Sharpe ratio the better the Fund's historical risk-adjusted performance has been. This is calculated by taking the difference between the Fund's annualised return and the risk-free (cash) rate, divided by the standard deviation of the Fund's returns. This is calculated over a 3-year period. |
| Sortino ratio | This is calculated by taking the difference between the Fund's annualised return and the risk-free (cash) rate, divided by the downside deviation of the Fund's returns i.e. the "bad" volatility. A high Sortino ratio indicates a low risk of large losses occurring in the Fund. This is calculated over a 3-year period. |
| Total Expense Ratio (TER) | This shows the charges, levies and fees relating to the management of the portfolio and is expressed as a percentage of the average net asset value of the portfolio, calculated for the year to the end of the most recent completed quarter. A higher TER does not necessarily imply a poor return, nor does a low TER imply a good return. The current TER cannot be regarded as an indication of future TERs. |
| Transaction Costs (TC) | The percentage of the value of the Fund incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the Fund's underlying assets. Transaction costs are a necessary cost in administering the Fund and impacts Fund returns. It should not be considered in isolation as returns may be impacted by many other factors over time including market returns, the type of Fund, investment decisions of the investment manager and the TER. |
| Total Investment Charges (TIC) | The percentage of the value of the Fund incurred as costs, relating to the investment of the Fund. As fund returns are reported after deducting all fees and expenses, these costs (the TER, TC & TIC) should not be deducted from the fund returns. |
| Unit Classes | M&G's funds are offered in different unit classes to allow different types of investors (individuals and institutions) to invest in the same fund. Different investment minimums and fees apply to different unit classes. A Class: for individuals only. B & D Class: retirement funds and other large institutional investors only. X Class: the special fee class that was made available to investors that were invested in the Dividend Income Feeder Fund. T Class: for investors in tax-free unit trusts. F Class: for Discretionary Fund Managers. |

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
